

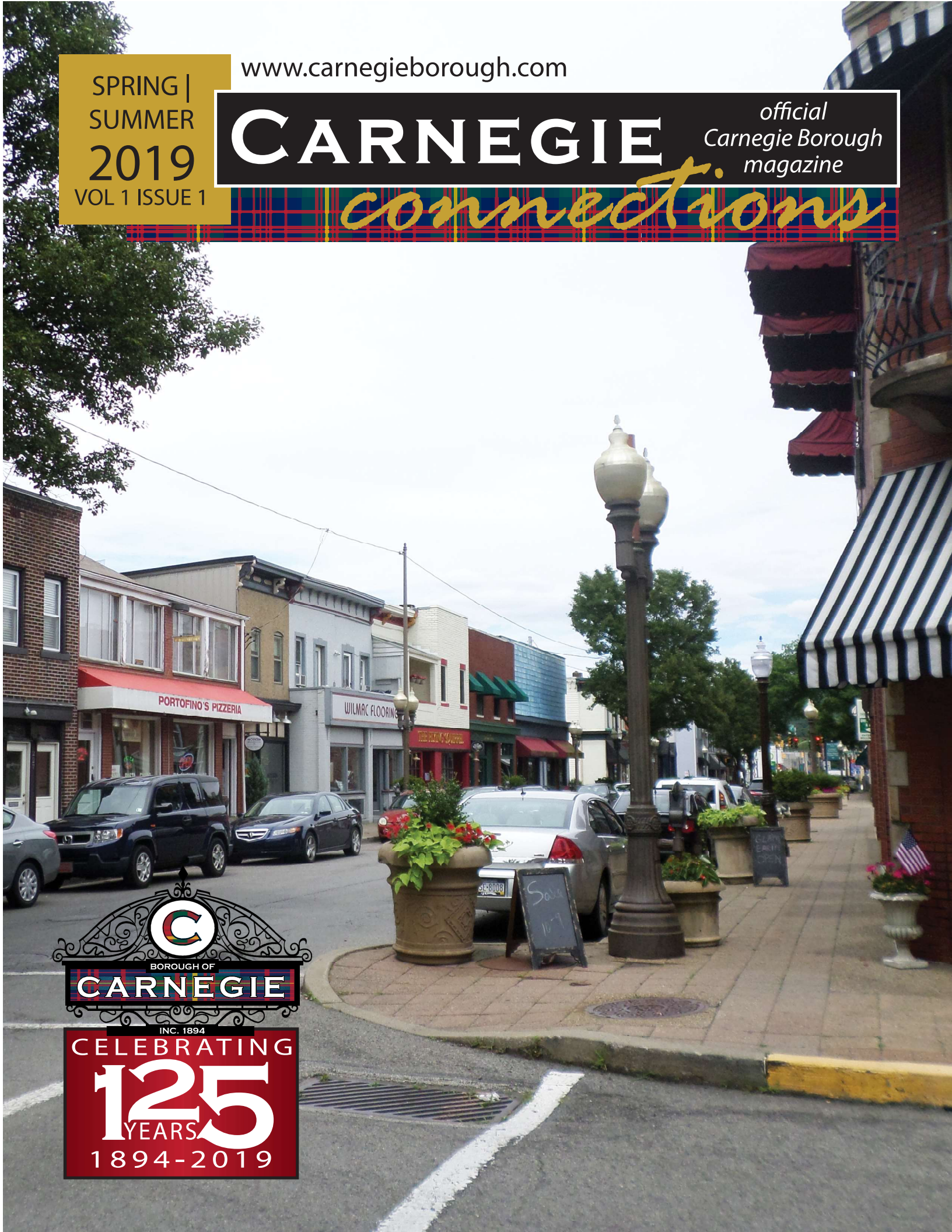

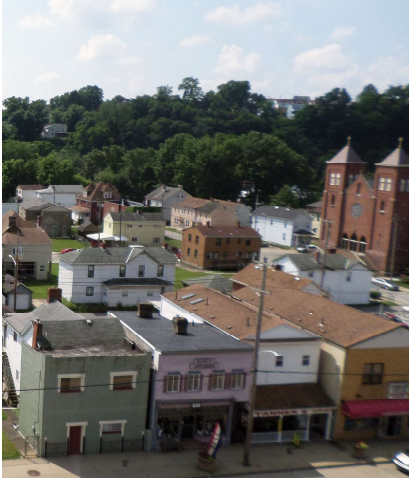

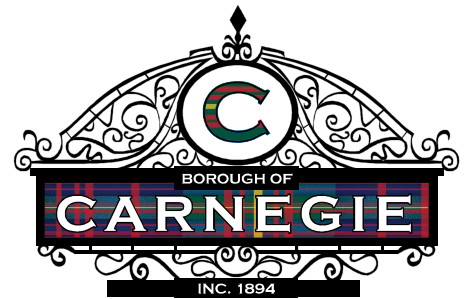


Dear Carnegie Borough

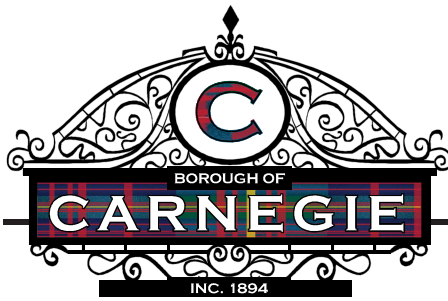

The CodeRED Emergency Notification System provides the Borough of Carnegie and Pennsbury Village officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire municipality. Individuals and businesses can register at www.carnegieborough.com/fire_ems.html and those without internet access may call the borough at 412-276-1414, Monday through Friday, (8AM-4PM) to supply their information. CodeRED allows geographically based delivery, which means street addresses are required to ensure emergency notification calls are received by the proper individuals in a given situation. The data collected for this alert system will only be used for emergency notification purposes.

Safe2Say Something



The district is partnering with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in launching an anonymous threat reporting system called "Safe2Say Something".

The Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office is behind the new program, created to prevent or stop dangerous situations from happening to students. The tip line will make it easy for anyone to file a report with just a click of a button or a tap of a phone, tablet, or computer screen.

The tip line can be downloaded as an app to any phone or tablet simply by searching "Safe2Say Something Pa" in the Apple Store or Google Play. Tips sent via the app will be immediately directed to 911 and school officials on a 24/7 basis.

The Carlynton School District "Safe2Say Something" team will be led by high school principal Mr. Michael Loughren. Loughren is the Coordinator of School Safety and Security for the district. Team members include Dr. Rachel Andler, Director of Special Education and Student Services, Mrs. Lauren Baughman, Principal of Carnegie Elementary, Mrs. Marsha Burleson, Principal of Crafton Elementary, and Mrs. Rachel Gattuso, Assistant Principal of the junior-senior high school.

Building level training for students will be provided in the weeks to come. The district will be working closely with the state to present a smooth rollout of the program.

The goal of the program is to strengthen the safety and security of our entire school community. Pennsylvania is the first state in the nation to launch the safety program which was designed by the families of the victims of the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in Newton, Connecticut on December 14, 2012.

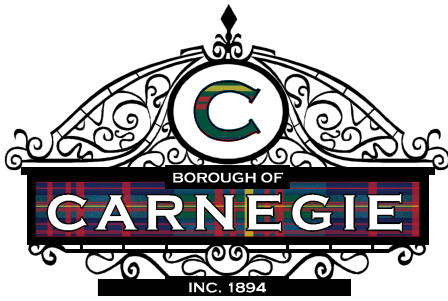

Celebrating 125 YEARS



A History of Carnegie

The incorporation of Carnegie occurred 125 years ago this March - but the region has a rich history going back hundreds of years. Chartiers Creek was considered a navigable waterway for Native Americans who were known to camp and hunt in the area during the summer. Pierre Chartiers was a French fur trader and among the first Europeans to settle in the area.

The early history of the borough is recorded in today's street names: Chartiers after the fur trader, Bell after a prominent family and Rosslyn Heights deriving from Roslin, Scotland. The earliest industries in the area were farming and whiskey production. Southwestern Pennsylvania was ground zero for the 1794 Whiskey Rebellion, as farmers rebelled against a whiskey tax enacted by a young federal government.

Prior to 1894, the area that is now Carnegie was two separate boroughs: Chartiers and Mansfield (named for its founder, Mansfield B. Brown). In the early 1890s, the

boards of both towns acknowledged that they shared enough in common to merge into a unified borough. Leaders from the towns approached steel magnate Andrew Carnegie with a proposition: they would name the town after him if he provided the funding to build and endow a library.

It's worth noting that the proposition came less than two years after the Homestead Steel strike, and the proposed name change was not popular with residents, as evidenced by several letters to the *Mansfield Item* from that year.

On March 1, 1894 Carnegie was officially recognized as a borough by then-governor Robert Patterson.

As the population in southwestern Pennsylvania grew, the chief industry shifted to coal mining and steel production. Carnegie Steel became Superior Steel Company, at one time the largest industrial employer in

Carnegie Facts

Pittsburgh Pirates legend Honus Wagner was born in the borough of Chartiers in 1874.

In January, 1894 Cora Astin was the first child born in the newly established borough of Carnegie.

In 1918 Carnegie suffered its first WWI battle casualty when August Klinkner died in combat in France.

In 1973, Carnegie held a large parade for Air Force pilot, Colonel Robert R. Sawhill, celebrating his release from the Vietnam POW facility "The Hanoi Hilton".

In 1946, Carnegie resident James Duff was elected governor of the Commonwealth of PA.

Carnegie was home to four movie theaters in the 1960s.

Carnegie Facts

There was a covered bridge over Chartiers Creek in the 1800s.

There was a time when passenger trains stopped in Carnegie 27 times per day.

The first streetcar ran through Carnegie in 1895

In the 1920s there were 14 sets of train tracks used by the PA Railroad in Carnegie. In 1994 there was one.



Carnegie. At one time there were five other steel plants near Carnegie that produced a wide variety of steel products that were used across the nation. With that expansion came an influx of all nationalities settling in the area, creating neighborhoods with their own unique identity.

Carnegie has also become home to a diverse faith community representing Judaism, Christianity, Islam and Hinduism.

Over the years, Carnegie has been home to several neighborhood schools. At one time, Carnegie had three elementary schools and a high school. In 1969, Carnegie

joined with neighboring Crafton and Rosslyn Farms to form the Carlynton School district.

Even with an impressive foundation and past, the borough has not been immune to trouble. In 1923, 1,000 Carnegie residents successfully turned back nearly 10,000 Ku Klux Klan members marching from a cross-burning rally in Carnegie Park. The steel industry largely collapsed locally in the 1980s, and the area in and around Pittsburgh was forced to reinvent itself.

In 2004, the remnants of Hurricane Ivan caused Chartiers Creek to overflow its banks and wipe out a considerable amount of Main Street. In the decade and a half since, Carnegie has reinvented its central business district to include restaurants, boutiques and cultural destinations.

Carnegie and its residents have stood at the crossroads of major events in history. Carnegie residents have served their country in every war dating back to the American Revolution, The Forsyth Farm was a stop on the Underground Railroad and Carnegie native Honus Wagner was part of the inaugural class of the Baseball Hall of Fame. The library that gave the town its name is home to a world-class music hall and the most intact Grand Army of the Republic post in the nation.

Carnegie today is as vibrant as ever with a thriving business, faith and neighborhood community.

Parking in Carnegie

Carnegie Borough uses a mobile app from Braddock based firm Meter Feeder, Inc. The app is available for download using any iPhone or Android device and allows users to upload and store their license plate and payment information the first time they pay for parking. Consequently, when a user's time is about to expire, the app sends a notification to their phone, alerting and allowing them to add more time remotely. Commuters can pay by app or at the Cale meters. Carnegie's enforcement officers use an administrative companion app, Meter Reader, as a tool to determine who has paid electronically and issue any citations, as needed.

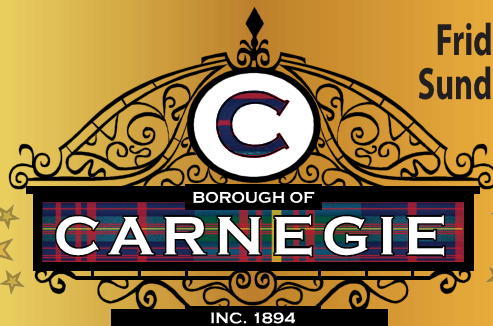

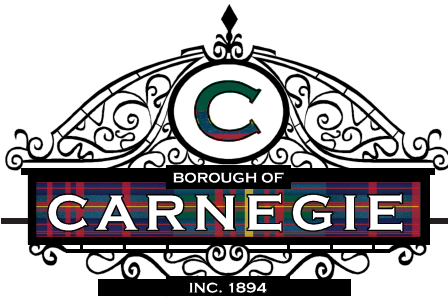

Top 10 Safety Checklist for Seniors from the Carnegie Police Department

-  Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms throughout your home.
-  Have an emergency escape plan and pre-arrange for a family member or caregiver to help you escape, if needed.
-  Keep a fire extinguisher handy in the kitchen in case of fire.
-  Make sure there is good lighting inside and outside your home to help prevent falls.
-  Make sure walking surfaces are flat, slip resistant, free of objects, and in good condition to avoid falls.
-  Keep ashtrays, smoking materials, candles, hot plates and other potential fire sources away from curtains, furniture, blankets and other combustibles. Never leave them unattended.
-  Have fuel burning appliances including furnaces and chimneys inspected by a professional every year to make sure they are working properly and not leaking poisonous carbon monoxide.
-  Install ground fault circuit interrupters, or GFCIs, in potentially damp locations such as the kitchen, bathroom, garage, near utility tubs or sinks, and on the exterior of the house to protect against electrocution.
-  Make sure all medications, matches, and lighters are stored out of children's reach. Keep all medications in child-resistant enclosures.
-  Set your hot water heater to no more than 120° F to help prevent burns.

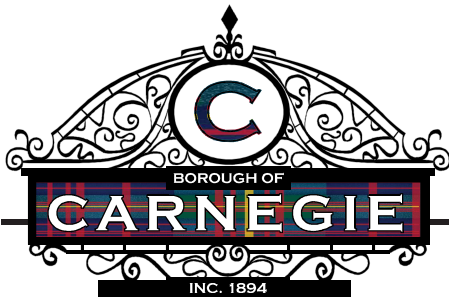
CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS

The Borough has an ordinance that requires smoke and carbon monoxide be provided by landlords in all rental houses and apartments. While not required by ordinance, the CVFRB highly recommends that owner occupied buildings also install and maintain these life saving devices in the same manner as required in rentals.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

A portable fire extinguisher can save lives and property by putting out a small fire or containing it until the fire department arrives; but portable extinguishers have limitations. Because fire grows and spreads so rapidly, the number one priority for residents is to get out safely. Use a portable fire extinguisher when the fire is confined to a small area, such as a wastebasket, and is not growing; everyone has exited the building; the fire department has been called or is being called; and the room is not filled with smoke.





Public Works

Yard and Tree Trimming Collection

NO GRASS clippings are collected at any time. Residents may place bagged yard waste at the curb, but only in proper bags. Bushes, hedges and tree trimmings need to be securely bundled. No loose material will be taken. Residents should call the Department of Public Works at (412) 276-0111 to schedule pickup of yard residue.

Plastic bags or sacks are acceptable containers provided the bags are designated for waste disposal. Plastic bags must be strong enough to maintain physical integrity when lifted. The bags shall be securely tied at the top for collection, and a capacity of not more than 30 gallons or loaded weight of not more than 35 pounds. Yard waste shall be drained free of liquids before being placed in proper bags. NO garbage or other putrid waste can be included. Bags must be securely wrapped and/or properly tied.
