





OCCUPANCY INSPECTION

Once the borough has received all paperwork and fees, an occupancy inspection needs to be scheduled with our code enforcement officer Todd Tulowitzki 412-276-1414 x1427.
1. If a building fails, repairs may be made and another inspection performed.
2. If closing needs to proceed with a failed inspection, a notarized Occupancy Affidavit is required. The affidavit states that the closing may proceed but the building will remain unoccupied until it passes inspection.
3. Each additional inspection will cost \$76.00





CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS

The Borough has an ordinance that requires smoke and carbon monoxide detectors be provided by landlords in all rental houses and apartments. While not required by ordinance, the CVFRB highly recommends that owner occupied buildings also install and maintain these life saving devices in the same manner as required in rentals.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

A portable fire extinguisher can save lives and property by putting out a small fire or containing it until the fire department arrives; but portable extinguishers have limitations. Because fire grows and spreads so rapidly, the number one priority for residents is to get out safely. Use a portable fire extinguisher when the fire is confined to a small area, such as a wastebasket, and is not growing; everyone has exited the building; the fire department has been called or is being called; and the room is not filled with smoke.

REMEMBER to change smoke detector and carbon monoxide batteries when you change clocks in April and October.



Public Works

Yard and Tree Trimming Collection

NO GRASS clippings are collected at any time. Residents may place bagged yard waste at the curb, but only in proper bags. Bushes, hedges and tree trimmings need to be securely bundled. No loose material will be taken. Residents should call the Department of Public Works at (412) 276-0111 to schedule pickup of yard residue.

Plastic bags or sacks are acceptable containers provided the bags are designated for waste disposal. Plastic bags must be strong enough to maintain physical integrity when lifted. The bags shall be securely tied at the top for collection, and a capacity of not more than 30 gallons or loaded weight of not more than 35 pounds. Yard waste shall be drained free of liquids before being placed in proper bags. NO garbage or other putrid waste can be included. Bags must be securely wrapped and/or properly tied.

Safety Talk: Poisonous Plants

Recognize poisonous plants and proper treatments if exposed.

COMMON POISONOUS PLANTS

Poison Ivy, Poison Oak, and Poison Sumac are the three most common poisonous plants that somebody will come in contact when working outside. All have common health effects but different in appearance. They can also differ based on the region where you are located.


Urushiol is the allergen found in all three plants. Poison Ivy, Oak, and Sumac contain this oil on the root, stem, and leaves. Urushiol stays active on clothing and pets, so contact does not have to be direct to cause health problems.

Urushiol is a very strong allergen. It is said that a quarter ounce of the oil can give the whole Earth's population a rash. Quick contact with a plant is enough to break out in a rash. People can be immune or become immune to Urushiol.

Exposure to Urushiol oil commonly results in an itchy red rash accompanied by bumps or blisters. Over the counter medications are available to treat most cases. If the oil is inhaled, or the rash is severe, medical treatment is necessary.

IF EXPOSED

1. Wash skin with poison ivy soap and tons of cold water.
2. Do not rupture blisters, rinse with warm water to help the itch.
3. Apply ointments to combat rash.
4. Seek medical attention if rash is severe or if inhaled.



Poison Ivy:

Always three leaves. No thorns.

Poison Oak:

Always three leaves. No thorns.
Similar to Poison Ivy, but wider, more rounded.

Poison Sumac:

Red stems that may contain loose berries.





Lyme disease is the most commonly reported tick-borne disease in the United States. In 2015, more than 22,500 confirmed and 7,500 probable cases of Lyme disease were reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

BACKGROUND

Lyme disease is passed to humans by the bite of black-legged ticks (also known as deer ticks in the eastern United States) and western black-legged ticks infected with the bacterium *Borrelia burgdorferi*. The Lyme disease bacterium normally lives in mice, squirrels, and other small mammals.

Outdoor workers are at risk of Lyme disease if they work at sites with infected ticks. In 2015, the highest number of confirmed Lyme disease cases were reported from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Minnesota, Maryland, Virginia, New Hampshire, Delaware, and Maine.

BEFORE YOU GO OUTDOORS

Know where to expect ticks. Ticks live in grassy, brushy, or wooded areas, or even on animals, so spending time outside camping, gardening, or hunting could bring you in close contact with ticks. Many people get ticks in their own yard or neighborhood.

Treat clothing and gear with products containing permethrin. Permethrin can be used to treat boots, clothing, and camping gear and remain protective through several washings.

AFTER YOU COME INDOORS

Check your clothing for ticks. Ticks may be carried into the house on clothing. Any ticks that are found should be removed. Tumble dry clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing after you come indoors. If the clothes are damp, additional time may be needed. If the clothes require washing first, hot water is recommended. Cold and medium temperature water will not kill ticks effectively.

Shower soon after being outdoors. Showering within two hours of coming indoors has been shown to reduce your risk of getting Lyme disease. Showering may help wash off unattached ticks and it is a good opportunity to do a tick check.

Check your body for ticks after being outdoors. Conduct a full body check upon return from potentially tick-infested areas, which even includes your back yard. Use a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body.

CHECK THESE BODY PARTS:

- Under the arms
- In and around the ears
- Inside belly button
- Back of the knees
- In and around the hair
- Between the legs
- Around the waist

POTENTIAL SIGNS OF TICK - BORNE DISEASES INCLUDE:

- Pain or swelling at the bite site
- Rash
- Red spot
- Neck stiffness
- Headache
- Nausea
- Weakness
- Muscle or Joint Pain
- Fever
- Chills
- Swollen Lymph Nodes



Be sure to seek medical attention as soon as possible if bitten by a tick.



Like millions before him, Domenico Masciantonio had little work and worried about his future in the foothills of Italy near Chieti. Like many others, he loaded his few belongings and headed for the new world in the early 1900's with his brother Pietro and sister Maria.

The trio headed to Carnegie, PA for a new life. It is not known why they chose Carnegie except for the lure and promise of work. After returning to Italy to marry his wife Amelia, they settled in the Cubbage Hill area of Carnegie where they raised five children and Domenico practiced his trade as a stone mason.

During the Great Depression, Domenico made ends meet by working on numerous stone projects reportedly as part of the Civilian Conservation Corps or the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Examples of his stone craftsmanship are numerous throughout Carnegie and include the Carnegie Park Stone Shelter. Each is a work of art and a testament to their unyielding sturdiness against the test of time with not a crack in their facades.

Today, the stone shelter stands as a testament to our immigrant history both past and present. The exact date of construction is unknown but approximated to be around 1938, about 85 years ago. The shelter has been weathered over many decades and in need of a full restoration with a few upgrades. Domenico's family, now in its sixth generation has partnered with the Borough of Carnegie to return the facility to its original and improved version.







A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque) - An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening - An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA) - An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation - A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.

ALCOSAN'S Clean Water Assistance Fund

The Allegheny County Sanitary Authority has created the Clean Water Assistance Fund to help families pay their sewage treatment bills. This program serves low-income homeowners in the 83 municipalities that ALCOSAN serves. It is administered by Dollar Energy Fund.

Who is eligible? The Clean Water Assistance Fund is available to ALCOSAN service area homeowners who meet family income limits set by the federal government.

How much will I save? The grant from ALCOSAN's Clean Water Assistance Fund is \$42 every three months. The credit will be applied to your account by the agency that bills you for sewage treatment – for example, these bills may come from Pittsburgh Water & Sewer Authority, Jordan Tax Service, Wilkesburg-Penn Joint Water Authority, your municipality or some other agency. The credits will automatically appear every three months, even if you are billed monthly, bimonthly or quarterly.

How do I apply? You can sign up by phone or through a local social service agency, but the easiest starting point is to call Dollar Energy Fund, **1-888-282-6816**. The Dollar Energy Fund can help you to find the agency closest to you or to set an appointment.

You will need to provide a copy of your water/sewage bill, which includes ALCOSAN charges, so have that available. You also must provide the Social Security number of the rate payer and proof of your household's monthly income. If you already are eligible for an assistance program through another utility, you can use that approval to verify your eligibility.

HOME WEATHERIZATION PROGRAM

ACTION-Housing, Inc. is one of the largest weatherization providers in Pennsylvania. In cooperation with the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development, ACTION is offering a free Weatherization Assistance Program for the City of Pittsburgh, Allegheny (including Mon Valley), Washington, and Greene Counties for 25+ years.

This free program is available for income-eligible homeowners and renters (with Landlord approval) who are at or below 200% of poverty (see chart below). Once a participant has qualified, an Energy Auditor will conduct an audit of the home to assess energy measures that will increase energy efficiency and reduce energy costs. The measures will reduce the amount of air infiltration into and out of the home. This process should improve energy efficiency, reduce heating and electric bills, and make the home a more comfortable place to live. No liens or encumbrances are ever placed against the property.

ELIGIBILITY:

- Meet the income eligibility requirements.
- Live in the City of Pittsburgh, Allegheny, Washington, or Greene counties, or Mon Valley.
- Lived in your home for 3 months and able to provide a copy of your gas and electric bills.
- If you rent, your landlord must sign off on the application.
- Complete the entire weatherization application.
- Be willing to allow services to be performed on the property.

Tutor.com is available from noon until midnight every day to get help from a real, live tutor! This resource is for kindergarten through college-level students who need help with English, math, science, social studies, or even finding a job. Tutor.com also has resources for helping with essay writing, skills building, GED prep, and other tutoring services designed specifically for youth and adults.

Working with a tutor on Tutor.com is easy! 

DECALS TO HELP EMERGENCY SERVICE PERSONNEL RECOGNIZE THOSE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Oftentimes when first responders come in contact with a person with special needs during an emergency situation, they are unaware that the person actually has special needs. The idea for the decal is to help first responders better deal with special needs individuals by knowing in advance the person is special needs.

Special needs (or additional needs) is a term used in clinical diagnostic and functional development to describe individuals who require assistance for disabilities that may be medical, mental, or psychological. Special needs can range from people with autism, Asperger syndrome, cerebral palsy, down syndrome, dyslexia, dyspraxia, blindness, deafness, ADHD, cystic fibrosis and others. Some of the responses of a special needs individual are listed below:

Displays inappropriate laughing and giggling
Has no fear of real dangers
Hits self or inflicts pain on self
Has an aversion to being cuddled
Avoids eye contact
Displays an apparent insensitivity to pain
Displays crying tantrum or extreme distress for no discernible reason
Demonstrates an inappropriate response or no response at all to sound
Possesses a stand-offish manner

I hope the decals assist emergency service personnel in recognizing and treating those with special needs when the situation arises.
