

#### **OCCUPANCY INSPECTION**

#### **Required when Selling**

Once the borough has received all paperwork and fees, an occupancy inspection needs to be scheduled with our code enforcement officer Todd Tulowitzki 412-276-1414 x1427.

- 1. If a building fails, repairs may be made and another inspection performed.
- 2. If closing needs to proceed with a failed inspection, a notarized Occupancy Affidavit is required. The affidavit states that the closing may proceed but the building will remain unoccupied until it passes inspection.
- 3. Each additional inspection will cost \$76.00



Americans are increasingly bicycling to commute, for exercise, or just for fun. Many states consider a bicycle a vehicle when it's operated on the road - and bicyclists must follow the same rules. Bicycle deaths are the highest during the summer months between June and September. Nearly three guarters of all bicycle deaths occur in urban areas. Failing to yield the right of way is the highest factor in fatal bike crashes, followed by bicyclists not being visible.

- 1. Drive defensively, focused, alert, and predictably.
- 2. Use properly fitted safety equipment such as helmets and reflective gear.
- 3. Ensure the bike is in functioning condition and that the brakes work.
- 3. Follow the flow of traffic and obey street signs and markings.
- 4. Avoid distracted driving through the usage of electronic devices.
- 5. Stay alert of both vehicles and pedestrians.
- 6. Announce when passing pedestrians and always signal turns and stops

### **Pool Safety**

As summer kicks off and pools beginning opening, swimmers should be aware of essential pool safety tips. Practicing safe swimming is the only way to prevent accidents in the water this summer.

- 1. Swim with a buddy
- 2. Never leave a child unattended near water
- 3. Install fencing, barriers, or alarms around pools
- 4. No diving in shallow waters
- 5. Do not swim during an active storm
- 6. Be aware of drains
- 7. Utilize floatation devices
- 8. Learn how to swim or float

### Reminders . . .

#### **CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS**

The Borough has an ordinance that requires smoke and carbon monoxide detectors be provided by landlords in all rental houses and apartments. While not required by ordinance, the CVFRB highly recommends that owner occupied buildings also install and maintain these life saving devices in the same manner as required in rentals.

#### **FIRE EXTINGUISHERS**

A portable fire extinguisher can save lives and property by putting out a small fire or containing it until the fire department arrives; but portable extinguishers have limitations. Because fire grows and spreads so rapidly, the number one priority for residents is to get out safely. Use a portable fire extinguisher when the fire is confined to a small area, such as a wastebasket, and is not growing; everyone has exited the building; the fire department has been called or is being called; and the room is not filled with smoke.

**REMEMBER** to change smoke detector and carbon monoxide batteries when you change clocks in April and October.






### Public Works

### **Yard and Tree Trimming Collection**

NO GRASS clippings are collected at any time. Residents may place bagged yard waste at the curb, but only in proper bags. Bushes, hedges and tree trimmings need to be securely bundled. No loose material will be taken. Residents should call the Department of Public Works at (412) 276-0111 to schedule pickup of yard residue.

Plastic bags or sacks are acceptable containers provided the bags are designated for waste disposal. Plastic bags must be strong enough to maintain physical integrity when lifted. The bags shall be securely tied at the top for collection, and a capacity of not more than 30 gallons or loaded weight of not more than 35 pounds. Yard waste shall be drained free of liquids before being placed in proper bags. NO garbage or other putrid waste can be included. Bags must be securely wrapped and/or properly tied.





### **Safety Talk:** Poisonous Plants

Recognize poisonous plants and proper treatments if exposed.


#### COMMON POISONOUS PLANTS

Poison Ivy, Poison Oak, and Poison Sumac are the three most common poisonous plants that somebody will come in contact when working outside. All have common health effects but different in appearance. They can also differ based on the region where you are located.

Urushiol is the allergen found in all three plants. Poison Ivy, Oak, and Sumac contain this oil on the root, stem, and leaves. Urushiol stays active on clothing and pets, so contact does not have to be direct to cause health problems.

Urushiol is a very strong allergen. It is said that a quarter ounce of the oil can give the whole Earth's population a rash. Quick contact with a plant is enough to break out in a rash. People can be immune or become immune to Urushiol.

Exposure to Urushiol oil commonly results in an itchy red rash accompanied by bumps or blisters. Over the counter medications are available to treat most cases. If the oil is inhaled, or the rash is severe, medical treatment is necessary.



#### **Poison Ivy:**

Always three leaves. No thorns.

#### Poison Oak:

Always three leaves. No thorns. Similar to Poison Ivy, but wider, more rounded.

#### **Poison Sumac:**

Red stems that may contain loose berries.

#### IF EXPOSED

- 1. Wash skin with poison ivy soap and tons of cold water.
- 2. Do not rupture blisters, rinse with warm water to help the itch.
- 3. Apply ointments to combat rash.
- 4. Seek medical attention if rash is severe or if inhaled.







Lyme disease is the most commonly reported tick-borne disease in the United States. In 2015, more than 22,500 confirmed and 7,500 probable cases of Lyme disease were reported to the Deters for Disease Control and Prevention.

#### BACKGROUND

Lyme disease is passed to humans by the bite of black-legged ticks (also known as deer ticks in the eastern United States) and western black-legged ticks infected with the bacterium Borrelia burgdorferi. The Lyme disease bacterium normally lives in mice, squirrels, and other small mammals.

Outdoor workers are at risk of Lyme disease if they work at sites with infected ticks. In 2015, the highest number of confirmed Lyme disease cases were reported from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Minnesota, Maryland, Virginia, New Hampshire, Delaware, and Maine

#### BEFORE YOU GO OUTDOORS

Know where to expect ticks. Ticks live in grassy, brushy, or wooded areas, or even on animals, so spending time outside camping, gardening, or hunting could bring you in close contact with ticks. Many people get ticks in their own yard or neighborhood.

Treat clothing and gear with products containing permethrin. Permethrin can be used to treat boots, clothing, and camping gear and remain protective through several washings.

#### AFTER YOU COME INDOORS

Check your clothing for ticks. Ticks may be carried into the house on clothing. Any ticks that are found should be removed. Tumble dry clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing after you come indoors. If the clothes are damp, additional time may be needed. If the clothes require washing first, hot water is recommended. Cold and medium temperature water will not kill ticks effectively.

Shower soon after being outdoors. Showering within two hours of coming indoors has been shown to reduce your risk of getting Lyme disease. Showering may help wash off unattached ticks and it is a good opportunity to do a tick check.

Check your body for ticks after being outdoors. Conduct a full body check upon return from potentially tick-infested areas, which even includes your back yard, Use a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body.



### Safety Talk: Housekeeping

According to the occupational Safety & Health Administration, approximately 1 out of every 10 workplace injuries could have been prevented by proper housekeeping.



- Keep walkways, aisles, and stairs free of tools, materials or other "stuff" that may be a tripping hazard.
- Clean up or block off areas where there are spills on floors, entryways, storage areas, and anywhere else someone may pass by. If you are not sure what the spill is and you are concerned the spill may be hazardous, block off the area and contact your supervisor.
- Repair or report floor problems, such as cracks, missing tiles, etc.
- If you are in the process of cleaning an area and the ground is wet or you have electrical cords or air hoses running across the floor, block off the area you are cleaning so nobody trips.
- Always put trash in its proper disposal container. If a container is full, discard immediately. Ask a coworker to assist if the bag is too heavy.
- Keep cords, power cables, and air hoses out of walkways.
- Keep drawers closed.
- Don't run or jump on or off work platforms or loading docks to maneuver around materials.
- Don't carry something so large, you cannot see where you are going. Sometimes it is the simplest things that cause the worst accidents.

### Follow the SLAM technique:


**STOP** - Engage your mind before bodily movement. Look at the task in hand.

LOOK - At your workplace and find the hazards to you and your coworkers.

**ASSESS** - The effects that the hazards have on you, the people you work with, equipment, procedures, pressures, and the environment.

MANAGE - Think to yourself - What actions can be taken to improve the work environment?

Sometimes it is the simplest things that cause the worst accidents. Follow the steps above to make the workplace a safer place to be.

### **ALCOSAN'S Clean Water Assistance Fund**

The Allegheny County Sanitary Authority has created the Clean Water Assistance Fund to help families pay their sewage treatment bills. This program serves low-income homeowners in the 83 municipalities that ALCOSAN serves. It is administered by Dollar Energy Fund.

Who is eligible? The Clean Water Assistance Fund is available to ALCOSAN service area homeowners who meet family income limits set by the federal government.

How much will save? The grant from ALCOSAN's Clean Water Assistance Fund is \$42 every three months. The credit will be applied to your account by the agency that bills you for sewage treatment – for example, these bills may come from Pittsburgh Water & Sewer Authority, Jordan Tax Service, Wilkinsburg-Penn Joint Water Authority, your municipality or some other agency. The credits will automatically appear every three months, even if you are billed monthly, bimonthly or quarterly.

How do lapply? You can sign up by phone or through a local social service agency, but the easiest starting point is to call Dollar Energy Fund, **1-888-282-6816**. The Dollar Energy Fund can help you to find the agency closest to you or to set an appointment.

You will need to provide a copy of your water/sewage bill, which includes ALCOSAN charges, so have that available. You also must provide the Social Security number of the rate payer and proof of your household's monthly income. If you already are eligible for an assistance program through another utility, you can use that approval to verify your eligibility.





## Car Care: Tips and best practice

Some of the harshest household chemicals are those used to maintain automobiles.

The easiest way to reduce the impact of your automobile on the health of our waterways is to check your car, boat, motorcycle, and other machinery regularly for leaks and spills from oils, antifreeze, and other hazardous fluids. If your car leaks onto a surface such as a road, parking lot, or driveway, the chemicals are carried directly into our rivers and lakes.

### Do...

...Clean up spilled fluids and leaks with an absorbent material like cat litter or sand. Don't rinse spills into a nearby storm drain.

...Recycle leftover oil or chemicals instead of dumping them in the sewer. Find resources for recycling or hazardous waste disposal of your county's website.

### Don't...

...Pour waste oil or cleaning produts onto the ground, the driveway, or the gutter. A single quart of motor oil that seeps into groundwater can pollute 250,000 gallons of drinking water.

...Wash your car at home on paved surface. Car washes have treatment systems that remove pollutants before the water leaves the property. If you do wash at home, try to limit your water usage and wash on an unpaved surface.

**REMEMBER...**if your car leaks on a road, parking lot, or driveway, the chemicals can kill aquatic life and harm humans by polluting drinking water and recreational areas. Respect our waters by taking care of your car!

### **Always Pick Up Your Pet's Waste**

### Did you know that dog poop is toxic to the health of waterways

Pet waste contains bacteria, medications, and nutrients that encourage weed and algae growth. When dog poop isn't picked up, these pollutants are carried by rain through stormwater sewers into our rivers. The EPA estimates that two or three days' worth of droppings from 100 dogs in a watershed can contribute enough bacteria to impact the surrounding 20 miles and makes them unsafe for fishing and swimming.

### **SOLUTIONS**

- Put it in a bag and throw it in the trash. While pet waste can create problems at landfills or incinerators, it is still a better option than leaving it in your yard.
- 2 Flush it down the toilet where it will be treated before release.
- Dig a hole or trench that is about 5 inches deep and away from vegetable gardens and any lake, stream, ditch, or well. Microorganisms in the top layer of the soil will break down the waste and release nutrients to fertilize nearby plants.
- 4 Use an underground pet waste digester. The digester works like a small septic tank by using environment-friendly enzymes and bacteria to turn dog waste into a liquid that is absorbed into the ground.
- If you are away from home, look for a pet waste station where you can often find baggies and a disposal bin.

#### REMEMBER

Whether it's a sidewalk, a park, or your yard, it's part of the watershed. Respect our waters and pick up pet waste!

### DECALS TO HELP EMERGENCY SERVICE PERSONNEL RECOGNIZE THOSE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Oftentimes when first responders come in contact with a person with special needs during an emergency situation, they are unaware that the person actually has special needs. The idea for the decal is to help first responders better deal with special needs individuals by knowing in advance the person is special needs.

Special needs (or additional needs) is a term used in clinical diagnostic and functional development to describe individuals who require assistance for disabilities that may be medical, mental, or psychological. Special needs can range from people with autism, Asperger syndrome, cerebral palsy, down syndrome, dyslexia, dyspraxia, blindness, deafness, ADHD, cystic fibrosis and others. Some of the responses of a special needs individual are listed below:

Displays inappropriate laughing and giggling
Has no fear of real dangers
Hits self or inflicts pain on self
Has an aversion to being cuddled
Avoids eye contact
Displays an apparent insensitivity to pain
Displays crying tantrum or extreme distress for no discernible reason
Demonstrates an inappropriate response or no response at all to sound
Possesses a stand-offish manner

I hope the decals assist emergency service personnel in recognizing and treating those with special needs when the situation arises.
